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GWE, HELLO!

Construction of the Mesgi'g Ugu's'n (MU) Wind Farm has entered the last leg of the race! The 150 megawatt (MW) project is slated for commissioning on December 1. This wind power project is being developed by the three Mi'gmaq communities of Gesgapegiag, Gespeg and Listuguj as well as by their partner, Innergex Renewable Energy Inc.

HUNTING SEASON

Hunters should note that regular construction work at the wind farm will be suspended for the moose rifle hunting season, which runs from **October 15 to 23 inclusively**. However, work will continue on commissioning the wind turbines and construction of the operations and maintenance building. No work requiring heavy machinery or blasting will be authorized during that week.

To make the season as successful as possible, we will also be reducing work hours. These will run from 9:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. for moose hunting week. To minimize disruptions to hunting, we will also limit our travel in the park between 3 p.m. and 6:30 p.m.

Since emergency services must be able to access the wind farm installations at all times, we ask that hunters free up roadways for safety reasons and avoid setting up camp within 400 m of a wind turbine. We also ask hunters to remain vigilant and to respect speed limits.

These special measures, adopted by the Liaison Committee, are intended to help hunters practice their sport with as few constraints as possible on our end.

PROGRESS REPORT



This past summer was a particularly productive time at the construction site. All roads at the wind farm have been completed, but regular maintenance work is being carried out to keep them in good condition (e.g., application of dust control liquid, grading). On Chemin Escuminac Nord-Est, culverts are being replaced and repairs are being made to the roadway surface. Toward the end of October, the road sections at kilometres 2 and 5 will be paved. The substation is almost ready and was powered up in late September.

The last wind turbine component was delivered the week of September 26. At the time of writing, 35 out of 47 wind turbines have been erected. Work on the collector system that connects all the turbines to the transformer substation has wrapped up, and good progress is being made with construction of the operations and maintenance building. Right now, 345 workers, including 34 people from the Mi'gmaq communities, are hard at work at the site.
